Sutton Poyntz Village WI

At our November meeting we welcomed Alison Bristo who volunteers at Monkey World and for BOS, Borneo Orangutan Survival.

She tries to go to Borneo to help rescue and rehabilitate the Orangutans at least every two years. Orangutans live in Rain Forest in Malaysia, Sumatra and Indonesia there are around 70,000 left in the world altogether and their habitat is shrinking all the time. Mainly from land taken to grow non-sustainable palm oil. But things are changing and they are now using

sustainable palm oil.

Orangutans share 97.8% of our DNA making them the closest species to us, they also have opposable thumbs which they use to make things and gives them good dexterity. The gestation period is also the same as humans and the babies are totally dependent on their mothers until they're around 9 years old. When the young Orangutan is 14 or 15 they will leave and probably have their own baby having learnt from their mother. The mother will have another baby but they usually only have 3 or 4 in their lifetime. Orangutans



are susceptible to the same illnesses as humans so anyone handling one has to wear a mask.

They generally live to be around 45 years old in the wild or up to 65 in captivity. They giggle, cry and smile and are gentle creatures. They are also extremely intelligent. We really enjoyed Alison's talk and I'm sure some of us will pay a visit to Monkey World soon. We had a collection of blankets etc for the Monkeys which Alison thanked us for. We also had a collection for the people of Ukraine as the temperatures will be dropping there soon and warm clothing is still very much needed.

Last month some of our members went to The Sun Inn for our Autumn meal and had a lovely time. Our next meeting will be on the 3rd of December and will be our Christmas Party.

There won't be a Meeting in January due to The Mission Hall having some refurbishments done however we will meet in The Springhead for coffee instead!



Companies and on-line sites have been bombarding us endlessly with Christmas advertisements for weeks now. You know the sort of thing. Perfume for your In-house Adviser at only £1500 a tiny bottle. Or spray-on deodoriser for the man in your life. Admittedly both have advantages.

If your In-house Adviser uses enough of the perfume, you won't need a tracker app to find her. If she's anywhere upwind you can use your sense of smell to locate her. And underarm deodorant can sometimes be thick enough to stick your arms to your sides. This means that try as you might, you can't get your hands free to buy a round in the pub. Not that you could afford a round of drinks after buying the perfume. But all that advertising might well have distracted you from the visit of Comet Lemmon. I don't need to tell you that Comet Lemmon was not the headline act at Glastonbury this year but actually an object in space. The clue is in the name. This comet came so close to Earth that there was a mere sixty million miles between it and us. Such a short distance in fact that you couldn't possibly have missed noticing it. But if you did, don't be too upset, as you can always catch it again when it drops by in approximately 1,400 years' time. Though you might perhaps be just a little more over the hill by then. But I digress.

Regular readers of Over the Hill will suspect that there is a reason that the number one thousand four hundred has been mentioned. And they are of course correct. It is because calculations, verified by that well known astronomer Mrs Barnacle of Wyke, show that this is the total length of time in days that Weymouth car drivers will spend in traffic jams over the coming months. Residents and visitors have been enjoying the Ferrybridge section of the South West Coast Path since it reopened in June - such a plus for our local economy!

The land remains subject to rotational slip, however, so I continue to liaise closely with Chesil Vista and Dorset Council's Greenspace Team to help ensure this section of the path remains open while monitoring, mitigation, and management continue. We have a site visit booked for January where any 'next steps' will be considered. On the Brewers Quay development, Brewers Reach and Coopers Mews have received civic awards for architectural merit, and work on the iconic main buildings continues apace, with the first residents due to move in next March. At a recent event, developer Jason Craig jokingly 'blamed' me for encouraging him to take on such a massive project in the first place,

After many requests from residents across the town for 20mph zones, I joined Town Council officers and fellow councillors at Weymouth Library for a public consultation. Residents were able to discuss various options and add stickers to a large town map to show where they felt 20mph limits were most needed.

There's overwhelming national evidence that switching to 20mph reduces accidents and saves lives and some insurers may even offer reduced premiums if you live and drive in a 20mph area. A digital survey will be launched in the coming weeks for all residents to share their views, with paper copies available in local libraries. To make sure you don't miss this important consultation, please follow Wevmouth Town Council on Facebook for updates.

As Chair of the Climate and Ecological Emergency (CEE) Working Group, I'm also pleased to announce the installation of a Real-Time Air Quality Monitor on Boot Hill. It will be fascinating to see how pollution levels fluctuate. especially on days when dozens of grain lorries from Portland Port coincide with cruise ship traffic and town-bound buses. With the potential addition of incinerator traffic, I suspect we may see pollution levels that at times exceed legal limits.

Looking ahead, plans are underway to form a Friends of Wyke Gardens group in the new year. This new volunteer group will support our Town Council gardeners in bringing more colour and interest to the gardens. Sadly, some dog owners continue to leave waste behind despite there being two bins that are emptied regularly. Please do use them and help keep this lovely green space pleasant for everyone.

It's been a busy few months in Wyke and Rodwell, with a strong focus on celebrating our neighbourhood's creativity and caring for its shared spaces.

This autumn, I've been developing new partnerships with local schools, artists, prisons and heritage groups to make sure the arts remain accessible to everyone in Wyke, not just those in the town centre.

I've also been working with to identify small but meaningful improvements around Rodwell including litter reduction, better signage for walkers using the Rodwell Trail, and ideas for planting and biodiversity projects near Westham Bridge. 



Presenting The NHS Dorset County Hospital Clinical Reflexology Project at an

International Conference Europe. Part 2. Demonstrating Professional Clinical Reflexology PCR - The Langstone-Wring Method

For those that expressed difficulty in reading last month's article, please visit my website 'articles' where part 1 and 2 can be found in original format with images and the Presentation Transcript and Demonstration Video can be found in 'Research'.

Following on from last month's Part 1 'Providing evidence to support reflexology provision in mainstream NHS healthcare' a power point presentation that illustrated the strategic route and data evidence that enabled an externally funded reflexology project move from trial phase to sustainable daily service status within NHS Dorset County Hospital Foundation Trust Cancer Service that remains operational to date.

Part 2 of my presentation consisted of training slides and video demonstrating my 20-minute Method Professional Clinical Reflexology PCR developed whilst working with NHS patients during their cancer treatment in the Fortuneswell Ward, Chemotherapy and Radio-

therapy (Robert White Centrel). A standard (level 3) model of reflexology treatment is normally 1 hour and aims to provide a relaxing experience to enhance wellbeing. However, providing a high standard reflexology service to NHS cancer patients in busy clinical settings with identified complex challenges required a new model of adapted advanced reflexology.

Firstly, the reflexology treatment needed to be shortened, and the usual firm pressure replaced with a gentler and smoother technique due to heightened sensitivity and vulnerability of this patient group both emotionally (facing fears associated with cancer diagnosis and treatment) and physically (coping with side effects of cancer treatment). Secondly, adapting the reflexology service delivery so as not to disrupt the day-to-day activities of a busy cancer unit and address identified challenges and risks. Including a) In-Patients in a busy ward in a hospital bed (the bed end and equipment needed to be removed pre and replaced post treatment for access to patients feet) b) Out-Patients receiving chemotherapy in reclining chairs in busy clinic connected to drips etc, c) Out-Patients attending precisely timed radiotherapy (in a separate building). Thirdly, gaining a deeper understanding of medical terminology and clinical procedures whilst working under supervision and in collaboration with staff, engaging in mandatory training, assessment processes and producNHS standards. Considering all the above and to ensure a safe, effective, consistent, timely and transferable service model, Professional Clinical Reflexology PCR-The Langstone-Wring Method Training was developed. Aimed at giving qualified reflexologists the opportunity to obtain evidenced and certified by leading industry accreditors, CPD training to support their applications to join complementary therapy teams in UK NHS hospitals and hospices. Graduates include DCHFT Reflexology team and **Weldmar Complementary Therapy** team having completed my PCR Method training. My PCR Method is gentle and lends support to the various nervous systems of the body with focus on balancing the Sympathetic and Para-sympathetic branches of the (peripheral) Autonomic Nervous system using the Vagus or X 10th cranial nerve as the main conduit, modulating the autonomic cardio-vascular, endocrine, respiratory, gastro-intestinal and immune systems. When anxiety is triggered (fear or trauma) the adrenal glands release adrenalin and cortisol this 'fight or flight' sympathetic drive response heightens nervous system activity, increasing intensity of pain, affecting blood pressure, heart rate, swallowing and breathing, digestion and all bodily functions that are automatic (not under our control). In contrast the body releases Prolactin, Oxytocin, Vasopressin and Acetylcholine to calm and enable the body to 'rest and digest' promoting balance and Homoeostasis. Delegates watched the demonstration video whilst practicing my PCR Method on each other's feet, questions came thick and fast throughout the session. When questioned as to the versatility of PCR, I replied that

ing governance guidelines to meet

my PCR Method can be integrated into existing reflexology protocols or can be used a stand-alone treatment and is not just for cancer patients. For example, patients diagnosed with chronic sciatica and/or piriformis syndrome have reported significant relief from symptoms after PCR treatment. Graduate feedback has reported the PCR Method therapeutic and beneficial in calming agitation in End of Life, palliative care, and dementia patients. It has also been used to support Parkinson's patients and many other diagnosed conditions where neurological symptoms are present. My presentation was well received, and delegate feedback supported my call for future degree status training for Clinical Reflexologists. It would be wonderful if a university would take on the challenge of providing such a course, who knows perhaps someone reading this might be in a position of influence - fingers crossed. I am not qualified to diagnose conditions however, I am qualified to prescribe and experienced to support patients with medically diagnosed conditions. Many patients tell me they feel their symptoms eased following a treatment and that they feel relaxed, and their sleep improved. (CACD) has its advice hubs in Dorchester, Gillingham, Sherborne and Weymouth. It also provides services from other venues in other areas ranging from Portland to Blandford to Shaftesbury. CACD is a local, independent charity which is affiliated with national Citizens Advice. Its funding comes from delivering contracts and projects on behalf of Dorset Council and other partners such as Mac-Millian. Donations and legacies are also welcome to support the

delivery of the services provided.

Citizens Advice

Q I lost some money in a banking scam and I am scared that it might happen again. What can I do to minimise the risk?

A Sadly, you are not alone. In September 2025, Citizens Advice commissioned a survey to find out the extent of this problem. Our research shows that an estimated 10% of people across the South West and around seven million people nationally were caught out by a scam in the past year.

The top five scams people have unwittingly fallen for are:

Online shopping scam (26%) - Includes fake websites and counterfeit or non-existent goods Investment scam (18%) - Like 'get rich quick' schemes and cryptocurrency scams

Other financial scam (18%) - Such as banking, fake loans, card and bank account fraud

A friend or family member 'needs help' scam (16%) - Tricked into thinking someone you care about needs money urgently

Mobile network scam (14%) - In-

cludes being scammed into taking out a new contract or paying for a new handset.

We are urging consumers to be cautious when taking advantage of shopping deals ahead of Black Friday and Christmas. As scammers get more sophisticated it's important to work together to raise awareness, report scams and share our experiences to help protect ourselves and others.

the centrepiece of each service, which begins with the switching on of the lights. and also includes readings, hymns, and time for reflection.



News From Trading Standards

Food traceability has become a cornerstone of the UK food industry, ensuring safety, quality, and consumer confidence.

Food traceability involves documenting and verifying each stage of production, processing and distribution. For the UK meat market this means that when farmed livestock such as sheep, cattle and pigs are born, each is given their own identification, such as unique ear tag numbers. All the animal's movements are then recorded throughout its life. When given feed and medicines this too is recorded, so checks can be made to make sure that nothing compromises the safety of the finished product that we eat.

The Dorset Council Trading Standards Animal Health and Welfare Team regularly check livestock keepers to make sure that all necessary records are kept. When on farm they also check on the welfare of the livestock to ensure that **Date Set for** they are fit and healthy and are kept in suitable conditions.

In other areas of food production. the Animal Health and Welfare Team carry out checks on arable farms to make sure herbicides and pesticides are used safely, and also to check that the finished products are stored in a safe environment, so preventing any chance of contamination.

Advanced technologies like blockchain and radio frequency identification tags are increasingly being used to enhance food traceability. These tools allow real-time tracking and can provide consumers with detailed information about the meat they buy. Consumers can scan QR codes on some meat packaging to view its full history. This helps people make more informed choices, supporting local farmers or opting for ethically sourced products.

The importance of traceability becrises, such as the horsemeat ceed'. scandal and more recently with animal feed contaminated with Continued on page 20

botulism. These incidents showed the importance for robust systems to maintain trust in the food supply chain.


However you choose to spend the holiday season I wish you the very best for the season, good health, peace and happiness.

Road Improvements

Dorset's roads and prove travel

Dorset Council has unveiled a new plan that could see up to £115 million spent on local roads over the next four years.

The aim is to make journeys safer, greener and more reliable plan covers all parts of Dorset, with more projects planned as funding is confirmed.

The Highways Capital Programme Strategy explains how Dorset could benefit from government funding. This includes the Local Transport Grant, the Highways Maintenance Block, and a new national fund for bridges and other key structures.

Dorset Council already has £15.5 million confirmed for to 2030, with more long-term funding expected. Most of this money comes from the Department for Transport and other government sources - not from council tax.

If current funding continues, Dorset could receive £100 million for structural maintenance alone. This will allow a steady, long-term approach to managing the county's road network.


