## **Sutton Poyntz Village**

It was yet another meeting where we come to appreciate anew this beautiful part of Dorset. Our speaker, Steve Groves is the Swanherd at the Swannerv at Abbotsbury situated on the longest tidal lagoon in the UK.

We heard how the Swannery, the only managed swannery in the world, has been there for eleven centuries. First established by the Benedictine Monks close to their Monastery as a source of food, however following the dissolution of the monasteries in the 1500s the site was bought by the Strangways family and it has remained in their ownership through the generations and is currently owned by Mrs Charlotte Townshend.

Over 1,000 mainly Mute swans, congregate there with them mainly paired for life, they nest and produce hundreds of signets each year. The Fleet Lagoon provides them with a fresh water site with a plentiful supply of their favourite Eel Grass and each year they are gathered, weighed and ringed and their health monitored. The site, a popular destination offers visitors the chance to feed and walk amongst the swans.

Steve is an excellent speaker, demonstrating the depth of his knowledge and a passion for the work he does. Members had lots of

#### A new native hedge for **Wyke Square**

When the fence at the back of Lymes Close started to look like it had seen better days The **Wyke Society asked the Council** Parks Department if they knew who was responsible for the repair. It seems it was the responsibility of the residents.

The Wyke Society along with the support of Cllr Helen Toft came up with a plan to plant a small native hedge along the boundary of the Little Green and the small private car park. This was felt to be a good proposition for the environment and wildlife. It would also enhance the area. Parks Dept were happy to help with this project and offered native saplings from the Woodland Trust and also helped by taking off the top turf to make the area weed free.

The Little green off Wyke Square is well used by the community and dog walkers. It is a green oasis. Cllr Helen Toft has always been a leader in campaigning to preserve our small green sites and has supported the Wyke Society in this project from the start. It was a very wet day mid-February when we all got together to plant ninety native saplings along the boundary fence. The Council Parks Department will give them a good mulch. They have certainly been well watered in. At this time when we hear of so many hedges being scrubbed out in the area it is nice to know that we have made a difference together.

The next project for the area is to purchase some bird boxes to go in the mature trees. Part of the Green will be left wild in the summer so the bees and insects can enjoy the flowers and hopefully the new hedge.



## Website checks to clean up e-commerce

Dorset Council Trading Standards have helped with national checks on websites for businesses offering renovation and repair work. The checks found that nationally, the vast majority of websites for these trade types, don't comply with the law.

97% of 184 websites did not comply with relevant consumer protection law.

85% of websites did not comply with three or more laws.

14% failed to comply with six or more laws.

The Trading Standards profession is concerned that this lack of basic information, such as business contact details, may make it much harder for people to get things put right, or get a refund if things go wrong.

The checks also found websites failing to display company registration numbers. A registration number provides potential buyers with more certainty around the legitimacy of a company. This

is even more important given that copycat and scam websites can exist.

Most businesses checked also failed to mention whether cancellation rights existed. Such omissions can potentially turn customers away, affecting a business' reputation and profits.

This year the national checks focussed on the Home Maintenance Sector. Businesses of all sizes were included in the check; small and large, local and national. Websites were checked for electricians, general builders, plumbers, window companies and gardeners.

The focus was on these trade groups first because they are the types of traders that Trading Standards continue to receive complaints about. Typically, that involves work carried out to a poor standard, unnecessary or excessively priced.

'It's great to be able to provide these events for children and their families and we look forward to welcoming everyone at the first event this April. No need to book, just turn up on the day and enjoy the free activities.'

There will be two more free community events this summer on Tuesday 6th August at Links Road, Westham and Wednesday 28th August at Wyke Gardens, Portland Road. A further event in the autumn will also take place and the Town Council will announce further details in due course.

## 80th anniversary of D-Day

A raft of exciting plans to commemorate the 80th anniversary of D-Day in Weymouth was discussed at Environment and Services Committee on Wednesday 6th March.

Weymouth Town Council has allocated £5,000 towards various activities to run on Thursday 6th June to mark the 80th anniversary and is also working with Portland Town Council and Dorset Council to coordinate several events that will make Weymouth and Portland a focal point for people to come to and enjoy this once in a generation occasion.

Events agreed by the committee include working with the Nothe Fort to host two early evening sessions where access to the fort is free for the local community. These sessions can accommodate up to 400 visitors at one time and will feature a D-Day exhibition, entertainment and potential talks or workshops. A ticketed beacon lighting event for dignitaries will also take place with 100 tickets made available to the public.

A 1940s-themed van would also serve up portions of the seaside classic fish and chips at the Nothe, and the Town Council is exploring whether some portions could be provided for free. This activity has been chosen to tie in with National Fish and Chip Day which has been moved to June 6th this year to coincide with the D-Day anniversary.

A bid for a RAF flypast has been submitted by Group Captain RAF (Retd) R J Tripp on behalf of Weymouth and Portland to mark the 80th anniversary of D-Day. If the bid is successful, the flypast will be visible across the Isle of Port-

land and Weymouth Bay at approximately 11am on the 6th, but is weather dependent and subject to national commitments.

The Nothe Fort is also developing an exhibition highlighting the human cost of D-Day, designed to be family-friendly. The story will be conveyed through models, video presentations, newspaper reports, voice recordings of residents' stories, and images from Weymouth Museum.

A possible static display of military vehicles either on Weymouth's seafront or at the fort to showcase some of the vehicles that are normally involved in the Town Council's Armed Forces Weekend event. If the vehicles are available this will be free to visit and take photos

A local Weymouth Punch and Judy operator will also be designing a WWII / D-Day themed show, which will be free to watch on the seafront in its regular location.

Cllr Ryan Hope, Chair of Environment and Services Committee, said: 'Wevmouth is set to be the place to be for people wishing to commemorate the 80th anniversary of D-Day. We're proud to be able to support our Armed Forces community by putting on a wide range of events to honour them, and also attract visitors to the town who might even view Weymouth differently when confronted with its rich military history. These events are in addition to our annual Armed Forces Weekend which takes place over the weekend of June 22nd and 23rd. Cllr Christine James, Weymouth Town Council's Armed Forces Covenant Champion, added: 'Weymouth's historical connection with D-Day has been well documented and so it's fitting that the town will become a focal point for those wishing to reflect on the past while also learning more about what happened in the run up to D-Day. Thousands of troops prepared to disembark from Weymouth harbour to play their part in one of the biggest military operations in history, and 80 years on, it is still just as important to remember the sacrifices they made.'

#### Sunflower event at Maiden Castle Farm supports hospital for third year

The amazing team at Maiden Castle Farm have done Dorset County Hospital proud for the third year running.

Hazel Hoskin and the family have

raised £15,400 for the Special Care Baby Unit (SCBU) at Dorset County Hospital from their Sunflower Trail last summer. This brings the total for the three sunflower events since 2021 to nearly £47,000.

Hazel visited the hospital recently to present her cheque to staff from the SCBU, many of whom she knows personally from when her oldest son, Thomas, was treated there when he was a baby.

SCBU Matron Debora Pascoal Horta said,

'We are so grateful to Hazel and her family for this amazing donation – one of the ideas is to use the money to help refurbish the family rooms on the unit. We want to create an ensuite bathroom so that families staying overnight with their children have access to private facilities – this would make a real difference to them at a very difficult time.'

Simon Pearson, Head of Charity at Dorset County Hospital said,

'This significant donation is the result of months of hard work by Hazel and everyone at Maiden Castle Farm for which we are extremely grateful. We would also like to extend our thanks to everyone who visited the Dorset Sunflower Trail, and to Dorchester Town Council and all the local businesses who also contributed to the success of this event.'

Last year's sunflower trails were breathtaking, and many thousands of people had the opportunity to stroll around and enjoy the beautiful walks through the sunflower fields. Hazel is already planning this year's sunflower spectacular - more information will follow, but the event will be in aid of the DCH Charity Emergency and Critical Care Appeal, which is raising £2.5million to enhance the new Emergency and Critical Care Unit shortly to begin construction on the Dorset County Hospital site.

More than once this column has mentioned that many years ago I was a keen runner. It is important to note here that the word keen does not imply talented.

The Dorset Road Race League hold races of varying distances all over the county and at all times of the year usually on a Sunday morning. I entered many of these races, usually accompanied friend Richard, who was equally keen but much guicker than me. The keen and talented runners - including Richard - always stood at the front of the field so as not to have to dodge around slower participants or lose time crossing the start line. By contrast I was always three hundred yards away, right at the back. That way I was not in anyone's way and might, as the morning went on, actually overtake one or two of the slower participants. For instance, those on crutches or pulling a tractor tyre as part of a sponsored charity event. This was, of course, a great morale boost. There's nothing to makes you feel better than passing a huge tyre pulled by someone you know is suffering even worse than you are. Richard would be long gone by this time, but never seemed to mind waiting for me at the finish. In the winter, with no showers or changing facilities the drive home could be cold and muscle stiffening. Until Richard bought a car with state-of-the-art heated front seats. Heaven is a warm backside after a ten-mile run.

When we were out training together – and don't be so surprised that I had to train even to be among the back markers – Richard would take a longer route than me. But as we approached the end, we would both be sprinting as if our lives depended on it. Despite the different distances we had covered, neither of us wanted to be second. But I digress.

In my experience, no matter how steep the hill you have just run or walked up, another longer, steeper hill is certain to be just around the corner. This realisation is easily applied to life in general, and expressed more clearly as 'things only change for the worse'.

The truth of this statement can be illustrated by the report of the traveller who cheerfully arrived in a country where he didn't speak a word of the language but where he was immediately locked up on suspicion of espionage. This really happened not so long ago to a pigeon that landed in Mumbai with Chinese characters written on a tag around its leg. After about ten months of being kept behind bars on a diet of seed and water the Indian authorities decided it was probably not a spy but a racing pigeon trying to get back to Taiwan. His chances of winning his race were about as high as mine in the old days, and no doubt he would also have enjoyed a lift home sitting on a heated seat.

Then there was the recent story of the Frenchman who spent eight years creating a model of the Eiffel Tower. He built it in sections entirely out of matchsticks, 706,900 of them to be precise. He then assembled the sections to form a structure which a qualified surveyor measured at 7.19 metres high. That's 23 feet 8 inches in proper units. Richard, for that was also his name, then applied to the Guiness Book of Records to claim the world record for an Eiffel Tower built entirely of matchsticks. What could be more exciting?

Sadly, he was told that his application could not be considered because he had used the wrong sort of matchsticks. Apparently, these had to be bought from retail outlets and the incendiary heads then scratched off. Richard - the Frenchman not the runner - had started out doing this but found it too slow so decided to use headless matches bought directly from the manufacturer. Big mistake. It's a good example of the old advice which suggests that you should always read the instructions before starting a job.

Off it goes to the manufacturer who replies unusually promptly to say that you haven't returned it all, there's a bit missing. This is the point to pause for your Mindfulness exercises.







We had a phone call from Mrs Peggy Simpson of Oaklands Park, Warmwell who told me she lived with her family in the railway carriages in Coombe Valley for two or three years, while her step-father Jack Bray, was working for Mr Henry Diment the farmer.

He later worked for Mr Pashen at the carriages. Peggy told me how Manor Farm, so they moved from the railway carriages to one the cottages at Manor Farm, on the left before the church. Six people lived in the two carriages, four in one and two in the other.

Peggy told me that as soon as they had saved enough money she moved to No 1 Malt Cottage in Puddledock Lane. Her daughter Maureen Halem, who was born at No 1, now lives at No 2 Malt Cottages, which cost a lot more than her mother had originally paid for hers.

The photographs were taken in 1948 and show Peggy with her first husband, Victor Bates, who died at a young age, she was expecting her daughter Kay at the she dug a hole in the bank outside the carriages, lined it with six bricks and with a tin bowl on top would heat the water with coal or wood, so she could boil the nap-

No mod cons in those days, the toilet was a bucket in the garden; oil lamps provided the lighting and water came from an animal trough, outside supplied from a single water pipe. Cooking was by means of a wood or coal fired range, with a lean-to for washing - life must have been hard, but they still managed to smile for the camera!

#### Life in a railway carriage

The concept of living in a converted railway carriage may appear far-fetched today but in the Twenties and Thirties they were not an unfamiliar sight in the English countryside.


The earliest use of redundant railway carriages for housing has been traced back 100 years by Anthony King in his book The Bungalow. In those early days a number were converted for use as affordable seaside holiday homes at Shoreham on the south coast. Owning a weekend holiday cottage was an important symbol of social advancement in late Victorian England.

Carriages could be purchased from the Brighton Railway for £10, each towed to the beach and mounted on old railway sleepers. The benefits of creating these instant holiday chalets may be easily appreciated. They were solidly built of best timber well primed and painted against the weather. They came ready assembled with doors and windows in place while inside they were already compartmentalised into small but cosy rooms. The craze began to spread and other coastal developments appeared and some incorporated railway carriage homes in their rows of bungalows.

#### Great Western Railway post-1890 "City" stock

We have identified Peggy's carriages by the very distinctive curved-top doors. They were Holden 4-wheeled "City" stock used by the Great Western Railway built after 1890. It would appear that the vast majority of these coaches were built for the London suburban services, Hammersmith & City; Main Line & City and some Middle Circle workings. It is thought that these vehicles departed from London in 1925 when they were replaced by the suburban articulated trains.

The doors had semi-circular tops, so that tunnel faces would not be hit in the case of any doors remaining open! Photo below is of a model carriage (Peggy's carriages would not have had wheels and the roof replaced with aalvanised iron).

We are indebted to Andrew Cowling, one of our cornet players, who is a qualified practising herbalist. He has immense knowledge and enthusiasm on the subject and is a leading participant in this project. Rebecca seemed perfect for this topic, and we're looking forward to working with her on this unique collaboration.

With Andrew Cowling's help, band members have already shortlisted their favourite herbs. To help the symptoms of IBS the NHS website recommends the Fodmap exclusion diet this involves avoiding foods that are not easily broken down by the gut, such as some types of fruit and vegetables, milk and wheat. It states 'Certain carbohydrates have been shown to worsen IBS type symptoms

in some people. These carbohydrates are called FODMAPs, which stands for Fermentable, Oligosaccharides, Di-saccharides, Mono-saccharides and Polvols. Foods containing FODMAPs do not get fully digested or absorbed in the gut, so pass to our large intestine where our gut microbiome ferment them. FODMAP's are found in wheat, rye and barley, certain vegetables, pulses, fruits, sweetening agents and certain dairy foods such as milk or yogurt'.

Many of the patients I see have been advised to try the low Fodmap diet or have self- diagnosed IBS and subsequently excluded a substantial amount and range of foods from their diet. Self-limiting the diet in this way has the potential to create further health issues and frequently I encourage patients to eat 'more of the right foods'. The gentle and holistic approach of Nutritional Therapy takes into account the needs of the whole person, individual circumstances and supports healthy choices. Suggesting sensible changes to diet and lifestyle to improve health and wellbeing. more proactive with reducing single plastic use, recycling and generally be more aware of our environment. This is easier said than done, we must seek better public transport and all round better connectivity. Not everyone can abandon their car and walk or cycle.

The award is made to a group or individual who has gone above and beyond during the year on behalf of the Town. This year I decided that I wanted to thank the Steering Group for the Weymouth Neighbourhood Plan. This group including a few councillors and a number of local residents have worked tirelessly over the past five years to create our draft plan. They have researched in great depth and consulted with as many groups within our community as possible. It is very important to the future development of Weymouth that we have a comprehensive Neighbourhood Plan. 



#### A new fun and safe space thanks to the #WillDoesBus

Young people in Dorset have a new safe and fun space thanks to the #WillDoesBus which visits Weymouth esplanade. In a creative response to the evolving needs of the Weymouth community, the Dorset Council targeted youth work team is joining forces with Dorset Youth Association to roll out the #Will-DoesBus.

The bus itself was fundraised for by the #WillDoes charity, an organisation dedicated to improving the mental health and well-being of young people in Dorset. The programme launched on 7th February and spans seven weeks before moving to the Marsh Skatepark, the bus is open on Wednesday evenings for local young people, offering a safe and supportive haven from 5.30pm to 8.00pm

In a departure from the traditional community youth work approach, typically conducted in public spaces like train stations or park areas, the #WillDoesBus initiative recognises the challenges posed by unlit, cold, and dull spaces during this time of year.

The 'Will Does Bus' project introduces a mobile safe space, providing young people with a refuge to relax, play music, engage in games, and connect with trained youth workers.

## How do you say that? Perhaps you remember an American kids' series called Grizzly

Adams. Grizzly was a backwoodsman, and a lot of (live) brown bears featured in it.

Grizzly is now the proper name for most North American brown bears, but this name comes from the word 'grisly', which means horrible, and usually involves body parts; horror films are often called grisly. Brown bears seem to have been called grizzlies because of their ferocious nature – they will follow a running person at up to 30mph and even up trees.

We also have the word 'gristle' which most of us will recognise as the horrible bits in meat, the unchewable cartilage.

The other sort of grizzly is familiar to parents; children who don't feel well grizzle and grumble. Some parents might prefer the bear to the baby!
